Census 2011 – Economic activity, local authorities in England and Wales

1. Introduction

Purpose

1.1 To detail the first release of data relating to estimates that classify the usual resident population aged 16 to 74 by economic activity on census day (27 March 2011) and provide comparison with regional and national data and changes since the previous Census in 2001.

Background

- 1.2 The census has collected information about the population every 10 years since 1801 (except in 1941). The latest census in England and Wales took place on 27 March 2011. Census statistics describe the characteristics of an area, such as how many men and women there are and their ages. The statistics are used to understand similarities and differences in the populations' characteristics locally, regionally and nationally. This information underpins the allocation of billions of pounds of public money to provide services like education, transport and health. Decisions are taken every day using census statistics. These are as local as the number of car parking spaces needed at supermarkets, to wider programmes, for example, where to target government training schemes. The numbers of school spaces, houses, care homes, or the development of traffic management systems or funding for local and unitary authorities, are all influenced by the census.
- 1.3 The 2011 Census achieved its overall target response rate of 94 per cent of the usually resident population of England and Wales, and over 80 per cent in all local and unitary authorities. The population estimate for England and Wales of 56.1 million is estimated with 95 per cent confidence to be accurate to within +/- 85,000 (0.15 per cent). The 2011 Census provides a high quality estimate of the population that people can use with confidence.
- 1.4 Economic activity relates to whether or not a person who was aged 16 to 74 was working or looking for work in the week before census. Rather than a simple indicator of whether or not someone was currently in employment, it provides a measure of whether or not a person was an active participant in the labour market.

A person's economic activity is derived from their 'Activity last week'. This is an indicator of their status or availability for employment - whether employed, actively looking for work, waiting to start a new job, available to start a new job, or their status if not employed or not seeking employment. Additional information included in the economic activity classification is also derived from information about the number of hours a person works and their type of employment - whether employed or self-employed.

The census concept of economic activity is compatible with the standard for economic status defined by the International Labour Organisation (ILO). It is one of a number of definitions used internationally to produce accurate and comparable statistics on employment, unemployment and economic status.

Economic Activity - Summary of Information

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2.0 Headlines from 2011 Census

- 2.1 The Census data has identified that:
- 36.7% of Doncaster's residents, who are classified as 'economically active' are in full time employment, 0.2% up on the 2001 census return. The proportion of people I full time employment is still below both the regional (37%) and national (38.5%) average although the gap is narrowing as regional and national average although the gap is closing as both have seen a fall since 2001 of 1.8% and 2.1% respectively.
- 5.7% of Doncaster's residents, who are classified as 'economically active' are unemployed, 1.5% higher than in 2001. Both the regional and national average have increased but not to the same extent with the regional average up 1.1% to 4.8% whilst the national average has risen 1% to 4.4%
- 5.9% of Doncaster residents, who are classified as 'economically inactive' are categorised as 'long term sick or disabled'. Although this remains higher than both the regional and national average the gap has closed as regionally it has fallen 1.6% to 4.5% and nationally it is down 1.3% to 4.2%
- Over 4,100 young people aged 16-24 are unemployed; this represents 1.9% of the residents aged between 16 and 74. Again this is higher than both the regional (1.5%) and national (1.2%) average.
- Nearly 5,000 (2.2%) of residents aged between 16 and 74 are classified as 'long-term unemployed' (i.e. unemployed at the time of the 2011 Census and the year they last worked was 2009 or earlier). The regional average is 1.9% and the nation average is 1.7%.
- The main activity of employer or business employing the largest percentage of Doncaster residents are the Wholesale and Retail trade (19.4%), Human Health and social work activities (13.3%), Manufacturing (10.7%), Construction (9.7%) and education (8.5%).
- Over 30% of Doncaster residents have no formal qualifications, compared with a Regional average of 25.8% and National average of 22.5%.
- 7.9% of Doncaster residents have a degree or higher degree, well below both the regional (13.9%) and national (17.4%) average.

3.0 Economic Activity in Doncaster

36.7% of Doncaster's residents, who are classified as 'economically active' are in full time employment, 0.2% up on the 2001 census return. Although this is slightly below the average for the Yorkshire and Humber region (37%) the 'gap' has narrowed as the regional average has fallen 1.8% since 2001. it is a similar story nationally with the average higher at 38,5% but this has fallen 2.1% since the last Census.

5.7% of Doncaster's residents, who are classified as 'economically active' are unemployed. This is 1.5% higher than in 2001 and is the highest figure amongst the four South Yorkshire authorities and higher than both the regional (4.8%) and national (4.4%) average,

5.9% of Doncaster residents, who are classified as 'economically inactive' are categorised as 'long term sick or disabled'. Although this is 2.5% down on the 2001 figure it is again higher than both the regional (4.5%) and national (4.2%) average.

Economically active

A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically active if, in the week before the census, they were

- in employment, as an employee of selfemployed:
- not in employment, but were seeking work and ready to start work within two weeks, or
- not in employment, but waiting to start a job already obtained and available.

Full-time students who fulfil any of these criteria are classified as economically active and are counted separately in the 'Full-time student' category of economically active - they are not included in any of the other categories such as employees or unemployed.

Economically Inactive

A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically inactive if, in the week before the census, they were not in employment but did not meet the criteria to be classified as 'Unemployed' This includes a person looking for work but not available to start work within two weeks, as well as anyone not looking for work, or unable to work - for example retired, looking after home/family, permanently sick or disabled.

Students who fulfil any of these criteria are also classified as economically inactive. This does not necessarily mean in full-time education and excludes students who were working or in some other way were economically active.

3.4 Unemployment -Doncaster

Over 4,100 young people aged 16-24 are unemployed; this represents 1.9% of the residents aged between 16 and 74. In South Yorkshire the average is 1.6, for the Yorkshire and Humber it is 1.5% and nationally 1.2%. (There are no comparative figures from the 2001 census).

A person aged 16 to 74 is classified as unemployed if they are not in employment, are available to start work in the next two weeks, and either looked for work in the last four weeks or are waiting to start a new job.

Nearly 5,000 (2.2%) of residents aged between 16 and 74 are classified as 'long-term unemployed' (i.e. unemployed at the time of the 2011 Census and the year they last worked was 2009 or earlier). This is highest figure amongst the South Yorkshire authorities and higher than both the regional (1.9%) and national (1.7%) average.

3.6 Unemployment (Comparator group)

The chart below shows the proportion of population in the 16-74 age group by comparator authority for 2011 classified as 'economically active – unemployed'. The figures range from 4.4% (Durham) to 6.8% (Walsall) with the majority of the comparator authorities grouped in the range 4.9 - 5.2% whilst the national average is 4.4%. All authorities in the group have seen an increase in the last 10 years with only Durham (0.5%) and Stockton (0.7%) seeing a smaller increase than the national average (which is up 1% since 2001).

Although national issues have undoubtedly had an impact on the percentage of the Doncaster population that are 'economically active – unemployed' it should be noted that the increase locally is higher than the average of both our comparator group (1.4%) and the regional figure (1.1%) and is the largest increase amongst the four South Yorkshire Authorities; (Barnsley up1.2%; Rotherham 1.3% and Sheffield 0.6%).

3.7 Industry – main activity of employer or business – South Yorkshire

The main activity of employer or business employing the largest percentage of Doncaster residents are the Wholesale and Retail trade (19.4%), Human Health and social work activities (13.3%), Manufacturing (10.7%), Construction (9.7%) and education (8.5%). These are the top 5 areas in each of the 4 South Yorkshire authorities as well as regionally

and nationally (although not necessarily in the same order).

The main area of occupation of Doncaster resident's is classified as 'elementary occupations'. Occupations classified at this level will, at best, usually require a minimum general level of education, and are therefore likely to be low paid. The high percentage of Doncaster's population employed in this area may be a reflection of the number of residents who have no, or a basic level qualification (see table 4).

Over 30% of Doncaster residents have no formal qualifications, well above the Regional (25.8%) and National (22.5%) and this obviously has an impact on the type of work that they are able to find. It is likely to be unskilled, low paid, elementary occupations with little or no opportunity for career progression.

With only 7.9% of the population (aged 16-74) having a degree or higher degree Doncaster trails well behind both the regional (13.9%) and national (17.4%) average.
